The New Bedford Historical Commission (NBHC) is the city authority responsible for community-wide historic preservation planning established in 1972. The NBHC is supported by the Preservation Planner through the Department of Planning, Housing and Community Development, which provides administrative assistance to the Commission and leads preservation planning activities and practices for neighborhood restoration, downtown and commercial district revitalization, and heritage tourism efforts that benefit the cultural and economic welfare of the community.

The Massachusetts Historical Commission is the state regulatory agency for preservation, overseeing review, compliance, grants, surveys, planning, etc. as well as administering federal preservation programs in the state. It was established by the state legislature in 1963. The Commission consists of <u>17</u> <u>members</u> appointed from various disciplines who serve as the State Review Board for state and federal preservation programs. The professional staff of the Commission includes historians, architects, archaeologists, geographers, and preservation planners. The state's preservation programs are administered through MHC's <u>Preservation Planning</u>, <u>Grants</u>, and <u>Technical Services Divisions</u>.

-Search the MACRIS (Massachusetts Cultural Resource Information System) database to see what information is available for your historic property. <u>https://mhc-macris.net</u>. This is a great tool for research.

-Use MACRIS Maps – Search by location and visually see historic information, districts, etc. in a map format. <u>https://maps.mhc-macris.net</u>.

3.) Show Me the Money...

The #1 most asked question is, "Is there money for to help me restore my historic home?" The answer right now is, unfortunately no. Most grants and other preservation funding programs are for non-profits, municipalities, or other organizations. The state and federal tax credit programs are only applicable to income-producing property. Other communities have put programs in place, such as a historic homeowner loan program the city of Arlington put into place in the 1980's using CDBG funds. Currently, private homeowners in New Bedford need to seek traditional financing and/or learn by doing. Learning how to prioritize the work/restoration that is needed on your historic home can make the overall project more manageable and allow you to budget accordingly.
